Talking Points for City of Jackson Mississippi with Federal EPA

- 1. Jackson needs hands on Technical Assistance and emergency funding to deal with antiquated equipment and electrical issues at both the Curtis and Fewell plants
- **2.** The rainy season approaches and any short term fixes may not stand the test of the system if the rivers overflow again
- **3.** The power stations are very destressed and have to be manually maintained, this needs major attention now
- **4.** The noise about the state wanting to loan Jackson money is just noise. We have over 50% of our customers either unable or unwilling to pay their water bills. Jackson already has \$60 Million in loans it cannot afford the state's terms. Those loans need to be restructured with built in forgiveness and disaster relief interest rates.
- **5.** The State has declared an emergency, not a disaster, and therefore has limited our relief funding and its own liability
- **6.** We need a new look at possible funding. We need to be eligible for grant funding in the model of the Flint Michigan model.
- 7. We need to relook at how the SRF (State Revolving Fund) program can best help us. We need one of the best from EPA on this.
- **8.** The city of Jackson will hire a recovery chief, a unified command supervisor, to focus on this effort and ensure the collaboration of all the required parties. This person will have the responsibility and authority to get the job done
- **9.** After our emergency is resolved we must look ahead to the repair and modernization of the entire system. It will be very expensive and must have substantial federal aid.
