Subject: Nevada Voters Want Senator Heller to Reject Kavanaugh's Supreme Court Nomination

Date: August 23, 2018

A new Public Policy Polling survey finds that 47% of Nevada voters already think that Dean Heller should reject Trump's Supreme Court nominee Brett Kavanaugh. Only 42% think he should vote to confirm him.

The more Nevadans learn about Kavanaugh's positions on health care and *Roe v. Wade*, the less support he receives. **When Nevadans learn that Kavanaugh will likely support President Trump's lawsuit overturning protections for people with pre-existing conditions, they are 52% less likely to support him and only 16% more likely.**

- When learning that Kavanaugh would likely tip the balance on the Court to overturn *Roe v. Wade*, voters are 52% less likely to support his confirmation, and only 25% more likely.

And if Senator Heller votes to confirm Kavanaugh, voters are less likely to support him in his next election by 11 points, with 47% saying they would be less likely to support him and only 36% who would be more likely.

Nevada voters also disagree with Senator Heller's willingness to vote on Kavanaugh's nomination without reviewing his full record. Nevada voters overwhelmingly (57% to 33%) believe that there should be a complete and thorough review of Kavanaugh before holding a vote to confirm him to the Supreme Court, including all documents from his time on the US Court of Appeals and working in the Bush White House. **By 16 points (52%-36%), they don't believe Heller should vote to confirm him until that happens, including 55% of Nevadans over 65.**

This poll also shows slightly more than a third of Nevadans approve of Senator Heller's job performance, while 52% disapprove of the job he is doing for Nevadans.

PPP surveyed 529 Nevada voters from August 20-21, 2018. The margin of error is +/- 4.3%. This poll was conducted by automated telephone interviews on behalf of Protect Our Care.
